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Help To Teach Your Student Reading Skills

We cannot stress enough how important it is to read with your student at home and allow them multiple opportunities to read. With the state mandate of the Third **Grade Reading Guar**antee, it is important to get our young students reading...and understanding what they read! As we approach the midpoint of the year, we will be looking to see how much growth they have shown since the start of the year. We look at an article from Scholastic to find ways for you to help your student with reading skills at home.

In <u>5 Easy Skills to Teach</u>
<u>Kids During Read-</u>
<u>Alouds</u>, the author, Amy
Mascott, shares tips for
enriching your students
reading experience and
gives suggestions as to
how you can help students become better,
stronger readers. Try
these suggestions at
home with your students!

- 1) Predict, or guess what the story is about before reading the book. This can be done after looking at the cover. It can also be done at various points in the book. Example: "The cat keeps following the dog. Do you think the cat and dog will be friends by the end of the story?"
- 2) Activate their prior knowledge by asking what they already know about the topic or subject of the book. Example: "The book is about penguins, what do you already know about penguins?"
- 3) Ask questions to help develop your student's comprehension skills. After every few paragraphs, ask simple questions like... "What will happen..." "I wonder why..." "Why is the little boy smiling?"

4) Make connections between what your student is reading and what they may have experienced. Example: "She has a younger brother just like you" or "The character just started school. Do you remember how you felt when you started school?"

Reading is such an important skill. Anything extra you can do with your readers at home, will help them become better readers and thinkers.

**Third Grade Guarantee is a state mandate that requires all students in 3rd grade to pass the state reading test. If students do not pass, they will be retained. Take steps now to prepare your student for this assessment!

Second grade students should know their addition and subtraction facts through 10 at this time of the year.


Third and fourth grade students should know their addition and subtraction facts **PLUS** their multiplication and division facts.
